WHAT WE'RE WATCHING

Today, striking health workers in Argentina are maintaining a road blockade to the country's biggest shale oil and gas site. Earlier this week, nurses, doctors and other medical professionals protesting at the Vaca Muerta shale site rejected a salary increase offer because it was to be paid incrementally rather than immediately.

The medical workers are exhausted from the pandemic, persistent high inflation and two months of protest. The blockade in Neuquén province could lead to potential fuel shortages soon if it continues as the state-run site produces nearly 13% of Argentine oil output.







Global

Globally, confirmed coronavirus cases surpassed 148.6 million with 3.1 million deaths.

- A paper published by the University of Washington's epidemiology department suggests that household transmission of COVID-19 from humans to dogs "occurs frequently."
- A coronavirus variant first discovered in India has been detected in at least 17 countries, according to the WHO.
- Experts in a number of US government agencies are reportedly preparing recommendations to submit to the WHO as it prepares for its second phase of inquiry into the origins of COVID-19.





COVID-19 Vaccine

According to the developer of the Russian Sputnik V coronavirus vaccine, the vaccine provides enough antibodies to combat the strain of the COVID-19 virus spreading through India.

- Ireland will resume limited use of the Johnson & Johnson vaccine, which will be available to all people over 50.
- The developer of Sputnik V accused Brazil of being politically motivated for its decision to block imports of the Russian vaccine.
- Kazakhstan rolled out its own, domestically produced coronavirus vaccine, "QazVac."
- Egypt granted emergency use approval to the Chinese CoronaVac vaccine.
- Argentina has resumed talks with Pfizer Inc to purchase vaccines against the coronavirus, as new infections surge.



Markets & Business

JPMorgan Chase has told all of its US bankers to plan for office reopening in July, becoming the first major Wall Street firm to offer a detailed return-to-work schedule.

- Asian shares were mixed on Wednesday, with investors closely watching the results of the US Federal Reserve meeting.
- The financial fallout from Archegos Capital's collapse topped \$10 billion after UBS and Nomura Holdings reported new losses.
- The UK government became the first country to announce it will regulate the use of self-driving vehicles at slow speeds on motorways.
- Microsoft's sales of PCs and gaming consoles surged in Q1.

- Hasbro recorded strong Q1 profits boosted by demand for Play-Doh and Nerf children's toys.
- Alphabet's Q1 reports far outpaces Wall Street expectations as Google's revenues rose 34 percent as ads continued to drive profits.
- US biotech company Amgen saw Q1 revenues fall as skipped medical appointments continue to weigh on the industry.
- Japanese carmaker Toyota notched record global sales in March as the company shrugged off a pandemicrelated chip shortage.



Africa

At least 5 died in demonstrations in Chad against the transitional
military council and French presence in the country. New President
Mahamat Deby did not address the protests in a TV address in which he promised to
address terrorism threats and an 18-month transition to civilian rule.

 The deputy leader of the ruling party of Lesotho, All Basotho Convention (ABC), broke from the party to form his own breakaway group, New Dawn, in a culmination of months of infighting.

• The **Ethiopian** Electric Commission reported that the Grand Ethiopian Renaissance Dam will start generating electricity out of two completed turbines in August.

• **Somalia's** Prime Minister denounced the proposed extension of President Farmaajo's term, adding his voice to popular and military opposition to the move.



Asia

 Asia's recovery from the pandemic will diverge with countries that have controlled the virus set for robust economic growth against ongoing weakness for nations that have struggled to contain infections, according to the Asian Development Bank.

Singapore rose to the top of Bloomberg's COVID Resilience Ranking, surpassing.
 New Zealand for the first time as vaccinations in the city-state proceed quickly.

• Hong Kong will reopen bars and nightclubs to vaccinated patrons from April 29.

 Medical experts at the OCTA Research Group warned that the **Philippines** could face an India-like surge.

The **WHO**, **the US**, **Canada** and several pharmaceutical companies announced further plans to aid **India** with drug, vaccine and oxygen supplies as the Indian death toll surpassed 200,000. Authorities in Delhi ordered a luxury hospital converted into a COVID-19 facility for the exclusive service of high court judges and their families, prompting public outrage.

• **Myanmar's** junta said it would "positively" consider ASEAN's suggestions on resolving the country's civil strife if said suggestions serve the interests of the country. Ethnic minority Karen insurgents attacked a military outpost in an escalation of tensions between the junta and ethnic minority groups.

• In a call with counterparts from **Pakistan, Nepal, Sri Lanka and Bangladesh**, **China's** Foreign Minister Wang Yi pledged to set up a reserve of emergency supplies to combat COVID-19. Chinese officials are expected to release census data soon (the census was completed in December), which is likely to mark the first population decline in over 50 years. A tanker near the Chinese port city of Qingdao was involved in a collision, spilling

Europe

 The French and German finance ministers urged the EU to fast-track member states' recovery plans and offered support for the idea of a global minimum corporate tax.

 Finland and Austria will ease COVID-19 lockdowns, and France is expected to in coming days.

- The EU warned that its Brexit trade deal would equip the bloc with new ways to tariff British goods if the UK fails to honor post-Brexit obligations on Northern Ireland ahead of a final step to ratify the deal.
- Hungary's parliament approved a law creating a group of new foundations, which government critics allege will hand control of educational institutions to Prime Minister Orban's ruling party.



Middle East

Human Rights Watch classified Israeli abuses against
 Palestinians as apartheid for the first time.

Israel said it had downed a Hizballah drone on the Lebanese border.

The US said that it had fired "warning shots" at Iranian IRGC vessels conducting "close range maneuvers" near US naval ships in the Persian Gulf. Iran ordered a probe into the release of a tape in which Foreign Minister Zarif was critical of the IRGC, calling it a "conspiracy."

 The US ordered all non-essential staff to leave its Kabul embassy, citing increased threats since Washington announced its planned withdrawal from Afghanistan.

De facto Saudi leader Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman gave a rare television interview in which he
discussed the country's Vision 2030 development plan, said he has no plans to ever institute an income tax, and
announced talks to sell 1 percent of Aramco to a foreign investor.



Americas

- In May, Mexico will extend vaccine eligibility to all over-50s; the country has thus
 far vaccinated 9.5 percent of its population. Mexico reached an agreement with
 Russia to bottle the Sputnik V COVID-19 vaccine domestically after delays in
 shipments. Mexico posted a larger-than-expected trade deficit for Q1, largely due
 to the chip shortage harming the Mexican automobile export industry.
- Venezuelan COVID-19 patients are paying doctors to come to their homes due to the high cost of private clinics and hospitals overflowing with patients lacking critical supplies.
- The **Brazilian** Senate opened a probe into the government's handling of the pandemic.
- A former minister in the government of **Barbados** was sentenced to two years in prison for laundering bribes he received from a Barbadian insurance company through a US bank.



Americas: US

- Across the nation, 141.8 million people have received at least one dose of vaccine, representing 42.7 percent of the total population. The CDC updated guidance, saying that fully vaccinated people can now forgo masks in most outdoor settings. Masks are still recommended in crowded settings, a recommendation unlikely to change until "widespread vaccination is achieved." The first US case was confirmed of a concerning COVID-19 variant first detected in India, B.1.617.
- The White House is considering backing an intellectual property waiver to expand access
 to COVID-19 vaccines. The Department of Homeland Security has delayed the introduction
 of its enhanced driver license (REAL ID) and identity document program due to the
 coronavirus pandemic.
- President Biden signed an executive order requiring federal contractors to honor a \$15
 minimum wage, a move that also increases pressure on private businesses. Census
 bureau data shows that almost 1.5 million mothers are missing from the US workforce, as
 compared to February 2020.
- President Biden signaled that he plans to send US-made vaccines to India.





Emerging and Existing Hotspots: Political Crises in the Sahel Complicate French Counterterrorism Efforts

Last week, longtime Chadian President Idriss Déby was killed by rebels while visiting a battlefield and was quickly replaced by a military council headed by his son, Mahamat Idriss Déby, as interim president. The succession, which is threatened by opposition leaders and protesters who consider it a coup, internal divisions within the ruling Zaghawa tribe, and flagging international support, threatens to destabilize Chad and further endanger France's counterterrorism efforts in the Sahel, already threatened by the coup in Mali last year.

Rising instability and drawn-out political crises increasingly leave France and the region with difficult questions of how best to maintain a sustainable and effective military presence in the region, how to address the root causes of terror, and how to engage with crucial but increasingly troubled regional partners.

Recent instability in Chad is especially threatening to France's regional counterterrorism efforts, as it hosts the headquarters of Operation Barkhane, the 5,100-strong French anti-jihadist force, and has itself deployed peacekeepers and soldiers to Mali and Niger to fight jihadist insurgencies. France established Operation Barkhane in 2014 amid increasing North African instability post-Libyan

breakup, initially intervening to expel terrorists from the Malian capital of Bamako and with a longer view of preventing Africa from becoming a terrorist safe haven from which to launch attacks in France and Europe. Since then, France's presence has grown, although Operation Barkhane has integrated the Sahel G5 (Mali, Chad, Niger, Burkina Faso, and Mauritania) and the EU-backed Takuba Task Force into its mandate. France's strong partnership with Chad is evident in its relationship with Déby - who faced several allegations of human rights abuses, and mostly resisted international calls for reform - and France's initial support of the transitional military council, with Macron the only western leader present at the late Déby's funeral.

Despite the fact that France and regional leaders originally acceptedthe younger Déby's succession as the best bet for shortterm stability, internal dissension has grown, and international condemnation has risen. Over the weekend, the military transitional council named a distant presidential runner-up and ally of the former president as an interim prime minister, drawing the sharp criticism of opposition leaders who had already denounced the transition as a coup. Yesterday, protesters opposed to the junta held demonstrations throughout the country; anywhere between two and nine were killed, according to contrasting government and civil society reports, and scores injured, mostly in the capital of N'Djamena. Concurrently, Presidents Macron and Tshisekedi of the Democratic Republic of the Congo met to walk back their support for the new President Déby and the military transitional council, stressing that they expect a civilian-led unity government within 18 months. Déby and the council are not only facing pressure from opposition leaders and international partners - it is widely thought that the younger Déby, whose mother belonged to the minority Gorane, does not possess the same authority or credibility within the ruling Zaghawa clan, perhaps leading to the reopening of old divisions that his father previously managed to control. At the same

time, the conflict between the Chadian government and the rebel group that killed the former President Déby is ongoing; the group, known as Front for Change and Concord in Chad (FACT), has offered to negotiate a ceasefire, but the government has refused. France may be further drawn into the conflict by conducting airstrikes on rebel groups attempting to take N'Djamena if the rebels range south again.

Chad and Mali, which has been governed by a military junta since the military-led coup in August 2020, are not the only Sahel G5 countries suffering from instability and uncertainty. Niger is politically fragile following the election of President Bazoum and a thwarted military coup attempt led by the defeated opposition candidate and former president Ousmane; at the same time, the southeastern states suffer regular cross-border attacks from armed groups in Nigeria, and the country plays host to some 90,000 Nigerian refugees alongside over 5,000 internally displaced Nigeriens. In Burkina Faso, ongoing conflicts with various militant groups and disastrous flooding have created one of the largest displacement crises in the world, with nearly 1 million people internally displaced in the country.

In the face of deteriorating political situations in Chad and Mali and, to a lesser extent, Niger and Burkina Faso, France has mostly opted to support controversial regimes to maintain crucial security relationships and avoid risking further destabilization that could embolden the militant groups it is there to fight. However, the ongoing conflicts and domestic conversations in France have prompted broader conversations about the long-term effectiveness of military-led solutions to violent extremism. Macron has faced domestic criticism for the cost and length of Operation Barkhane, as well as for tolerating the alleged human rights abuses of his African partners. Ideally, he would likely seek to draw down the French presence ahead of 2022 elections, although this seems less possible in light of transitions in Chad and Mali and a French view that the US' withdrawal from Afghanistan may embolden Islamic terrorists throughout Africa and Asia.

Many see the outcomes of the French presence as evidence that military-led responses to violent extremism, especially foreign ones, are ineffective. Ongoing conflicts exacerbate the political divisions, economic woes, governance gaps, and foreign interventions that are among the drivers of terrorism - many argue robust governance support would be more effective than military intervention. The Sahel

Alliance, a French-backed coalition of international organizations and donors, is one group attempting a switch in counterterrorism approaches away from militarism to development and governance assistance, and is sometimes cited as an policy alternative. Nonetheless, governance assistance at its current level is hardly a panacea (or an escape hatch) from a region where France is deeply enmeshed, and while the G5 is not entirely dependent on France for counterterror operations, the departure or significant retrenchment of Operation Barkhane would likely significantly exacerbate violent insurgencies in the near term. As elections approach and terror threats in the Sahel persist, France must decide how to maintain a sustainable military presence in the region.




As of 2100 hours US EDT on April 27, 2021






